

How Can I Help?

FOSTER CARE 101

Foster Care is temporary care in your home for a child who has been removed from his/her home due to abuse, neglect, or dependency. The goal for most children in foster care is to return to their parent(s) when the circumstances that led to the foster placement have been resolved. However, sometimes children are not able to return home and need a permanent family. This is accomplished through adoption. Oftentimes, foster parents adopt the children they care for. The Division of Family Services offers special training and support to foster parents who decide to adopt.

RESPITE CARE

Respite Care is very short-term care of a child who already has a full-time foster placement. You would help foster parents by caring for a child in your home for a few hours up to a few days.

VOLUNTEER ACTIVITIES

There are many activities available, such as tutoring, organizing donation drives, sponsoring events, etc. Foster Families need a variety of volunteer supports.

To be a foster parent in Delaware:

- You must be at least 21 years of age.
- You must be economically stable.
- You can be single, married, divorced, or widowed.
- You can rent or own your home.
- You can be of any race or religion.
- You will need to participate in 30 hours of preservice training.
- You will need to have a criminal background check and be fingerprinted.
- You will need to have a home, health, and safety study.
- You will need to provide references.

Frequently Asked Questions

I have children of my own. Can I still be a foster parent?

Yes! As a foster parent, you can have up to five children living in your home, including your own.

Can we foster a sibling group?

Yes! Family connections are important. We attempt to keep siblings together.

I'm not sure if I want to foster. What should I do?

Being uncertain is okay. Most folks need more information before they make a commitment. Orientation sessions are provided to help answer questions you might have.

Can I choose the age range and gender of the child I want to care for?

Yes. We try to match a child to a family based on strengths and needs.

What group of children is in most need of foster parents?

Teenagers and children with special needs are the hardest groups to place and therefore, the most in need of foster parents.

Isn't it hard to give up a child once you become attached?

Loving the child and then sending him/her back to a healthier family is one of the hardest and most important aspects of fostering. By helping the child stay connected to his/her family, foster parents often feel they have contributed to the strengthening of a family. The love you provided the child will live in his/her heart forever.
